NAPLAN

As parents and caregivers would be aware from previous communication, students will be completing online testing for NAPLAN between 15th and 27th March 2023. NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students have acquired throughout their schooling. I do stress the previous points of communication indicate NAPLAN is not a test that can be studied for, and students are not expected to do so.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process and should not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performances. On stating that, I do encourage parents and caregivers to discuss the importance of their children applying themselves during the various online tests and strive to show their full potential at all times.

Vaping

I am deeply concerned with the growing popularity of vaping amongst our young people in the community and the impact encroaching on schools. As a school, we continue to take a strong stand against incidents of vapes in our school setting. Along with education through our various programs, we

continue to hold firm on consequences for possession of a vape, use of a vape or distribution of a vape on school property or during a school event.

The following article from School TV and supported by the well known adolescent psychologist Michael Carr-Gregg, outlines further information for parents and caregivers.

SPECIAL REPORT: Vaping & E-Cigarettes

Vaping is becoming a trendy pastime that is growing in popularity across Australia, especially amongst teenagers. It is the act of inhaling a vapour created by an electronic cigarette, or e-cigarette. Many teenagers are succumbing to peer pressure around this risk-taking activity due to the ease of accessing and hiding vapes. They are often cheaper than conventional cigarettes, making it more cost-effective and attractive to young people.

Although under 18s are not legally allowed to purchase any type of e-cigarette or vaping product in Australia, teenagers are finding ways to access them online. Australia has strict regulations in place for nicotine-containing products, and attempts are being made to regulate vaping and ban the importation of them. Many of the flavoured liquids associated with vaping, contain not only high levels of nicotine, but other potentially harmful additives. Many of these "e-liquids" contain chemicals that are likely to be toxic, that when inhaled or vaped repeatedly, can cause severe damage to the lungs.

Vaping is often marketed as being the "healthy" alternative to smoking. However, doctors strongly advise that if you do not smoke, then you should not start vaping. Most teenagers are unaware of the associated risks and potential impact vaping can have on their development and overall health. Parents are encouraged to discuss the dangers of nicotine addiction and include e-cigarettes in the discussion alongside alcohol and drugs.

This Special Report highlights the facts around vaping and e-cigarettes and what are the potential risks. We hope you take time to reflect on the information offered in this Special Report, and as always, we welcome your feedback.



NAPLAN 2023 | Important Information

Year 7 and 9 students will complete NAPLAN testing in Term 1 - Weeks 8 & 9, between 15^{th} – 27^{th} March, 2023. Please encourage your students to do their very best in these assessments as this information is utilised by the school to identify students who require greater challenges or extra support.

WHAT IS NAPI AN?

The National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is designed to provide regular data on student achievement in the areas of literacy and numeracy, essential skills that each child needs to succeed.

NAPLAN is a point-in-time assessment that allows you to see how your child is progressing in literacy and numeracy against the national standard and compared with their peers throughout Australia. Proserpine State High School uses NAPLAN data to provide additional information about student progress, as well as to support the school in making informed decisions regarding differentiation and targeted teaching in the classroom, to improve future student outcomes.

Students in Years 7 and 9 participate in tests for reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation), and numeracy. This year, Proserpine State High School will be conducting NAPLAN online.

PARTICIPATION AND ADJUSTMENTS

At Proserpine State High School, we expect and encourage all students to complete the NAPLAN testing process, and we are pleased with our established tradition of high levels of participation. During the testing window in March, catch-up tests will be offered for students who are absent on test days.

Support can be arranged for students with specific learning needs, particularly if a student regularly accesses similar support for school assessment tasks. Students may also be withdrawn from NAPLAN; this is a matter for consideration by parents and carers, in consultation with the school, and would require a signed withdrawal form.

EQUIPMENT

Students will be provided headphones and a computer to use if they do not have access to their personal laptop.

FURTHER INFORMATION

Later in the year, you will receive your child's personal NAPLAN report outlining their results and how they performed in relation to national standards. The information you receive will be valuable in helping you consider your child's literacy and numeracy progress.

Yarning Circle

Deadly Choice Program:

What has been happening in the Deadly Choices Program lately? The last few weeks have been very busy with the Year 8's participating in deep discussions about culture and links to health, nutrition and exercise. Students were very knowledgeable about the food groups but also learnt about hunting and gathering traditional food before colonisation compared to how we get food today.

Last week we had two medical students *Melissa Petrovska* (international student) and *Smruti Patel* both studying at James Cook University in Townsville who attended our Deadly Choices program about *Harmful Substances*. Any questions from the students relating to legal and illegal substances effects on the body was quickly explained by our young medical graduates.

"Acknowledgement to Country" which our Year 8 students are performing is building up their confidence and paying respect to the traditional owners of the land (Gia People) which the school is built on. We have been going to the 'Yarning Circle' where students perform the acknowledgement to country to their peers and invited guest. I am very proud of the students doing this and following yarning circle protocols.

Yarn with an Elder:

This week is the start of Yarning with our *Traditional* and *Community Elders* who have lived in the region to have a chat with students. The yarning will take place at our school 'Yarning Circle' in the courtyard near F Block and the Resource Centre. Elder *Mr Brian Youse* will be coming on Tuesday to chat with the students and advise us on what art work or plants the school needs to add to the 'Yarning Circle' and surrounding gardens. Mr. Youse use to work at the school as a cleaner and is looking forward to seeing what changes have happened since he has retired.

QATSIF

Dear family and students, if your child is in Year 10 and 11 the Queensland Aboriginal Torres Strait Islander Fund (QATSIF) scholarship is an opportunity for your child to be financially supported in their education. It is a non-profit trust fund managed by Public Trustee of Queensland built from the labour of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queenslanders. Preserving this capital means the toil of previous generations will have direct benefits to the generations that follow. This means that every Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander student has a chance of becoming a QATSIF Scholarship recipient providing that they meet the student eligibility criteria.
