

Jack's parents share life and law changing story

Last week were we honoured to have Brett and Belinda Beasley, and their team of police officers, from the Jack Beaslev Foundation, attend our school to present their educational program Moment'.



Brett and Belinda's son, Jack, was murdered in Surfers Paradise in 2019 at the age of 17 by a group of teenagers who stabbed him. Since then, Brett and Belinda, have worked tirelessly to introduce and change laws in relation to knife crime and to use their voices to raise awareness of it in our communities. Jack's Law has now been adapted in other states in Australia and is being modelled in countries overseas.

The Beasley's presence at our school will be everlasting. Their story was raw and powerful, exposing our students to real life community issues reminding them of the power our voices have in pushing for positive changes in our society.

During the program, students were also shown real-life body cam footage of weapons being found on people in public places, and they were able to test out the wands that police use in their search operations.

We look forward to welcoming the Beasley's back next year when our Legal Studies students investigate Jack's Law as part of their criminal law units.





Empowering students to make positive road choices

On Monday, our Year 11 students had the privilege of hearing from Melissa McGuinness, founder of the award-winning YOU CHOOSE – Youth Road Safety program.



YOU CHOOSE is Australia's youth-led mission to change driving culture and empower young people to make positive choices as drivers and passengers. The program, which won the Australian Road Safety Award for school programs, delivers a powerful message about accountability, responsibility, and leadership on our roads.



Melissa's story and message have reached more than 250,000 teenagers across Australia since the program's inception in 2017. Together with her husband Peter, Melissa founded YOU CHOOSE after the tragic loss of their 18-year-old son, Jordan, whose driving decisions caused the deaths of four innocent young people, including his

own. From this unimaginable tragedy, the McGuinness family has created a national movement for change.

Melissa is the 2020 Gold Coast Woman of the Year, a two-time Queensland Australian of the Year finalist (2021 and 2022), and was most recently awarded an Order of Australia Medal (OAM) in the 2025 Australia Day Honours for her outstanding service to road safety and youth education.

The YOU CHOOSE presentation invited our students to deeply reflect on the connections between their intentions, choices, actions, and the people they love. Through honest storytelling and practical guidance, Melissa encouraged students to take ownership of their decisions and to look out for one another in "moments that matter."

Thank you Melissa for bravely sharing your story with us.
